2010 Accomplishments

- Improved response time performance by 6.1%. In 2009, units arrived within 7 minutes, 70.9% of the time; whereas, in 2010, units arrived within 7 minutes, 75.2% of the time.
- Participated with non-profit organizations for community immunization drives and health fairs.
- Partnered with local charities to provide gifts to hundreds of children.
- Established a partnership with other agencies to improve hospital transfer of care times.
- Updated the Clark County Code to adopt the 2009 International Fire Code with local amendments.
- Ground breaking of relocated Fire Stations 20 and 22.
- Received 2009 Assistance to Firefighter Grant to retrofit stations' diesel exhaust system.
- Received over \$200,000 in Rural Fire Assistance Grants to purchase personal protective equipment for the rural areas.
- Received \$1,075,500 in operational readiness grants for FEMA Urban Search and Rescue, Nevada Task Force 1.
- Received a \$570,000 UASI Grant for a regional upgrade of electronic patient care reporting (e-PCR) devices and implemented a new e-PCR system.
- Upgraded additional engines and trucks to advanced life support (paramedic).


